 \mathscr{M} ell, that will likely be a summer to remember. For us it was simply hectic. We started a major renovation on the house in June (still a long way from finished), got a number of gazebos out (and have officially retired from that), put in a walk and steps for Shannon (and then sold our dump trailer so we can't landscape anymore), and are building a garage with Ehren (our son-in-law). On top of that, my mother had a bad fall and was in the hospital for 2 ½ weeks (she's home again and recovering well).



We are so thankful for having the ability to do livestreaming. The fact that we have

been doing it for a number of years provided the opportunity to go through old services and look for appropriate music we could use for the services since we had to close the doors in March. I have also been doing a lot of reading from different scientific reports trying to determine how we can safely continue the music programme at Cambridge Street. There is some good information out there, but it is also clear there are still a lot of unknowns. Interestingly, having met Gael Morrison last week, her comment was: who could ever have imagined that singing would now be considered one of the most dangerous activities? Welcome to the new extreme sport!

But music will continue at Cambridge Street in a reduced or modified version:

Handbells: We will have three groups, two quartets and one two-octave group. Each player or family unit will have their own table to allow for physical distancing and there will be no bell sharing.

Cambridge Street Singers: We have enough interest to do two smaller groups (eight singers) that will rehearse in the gym. This will provide space for a 3 to 4 metre separation of singers. We will have a mixed chamber choir and a male chorus. Recordings will be made during rehearsal times to be played for our services.

Voices of Victory will not start until October and we are looking at the possibility of having one or two outdoor rehearsals depending on the weather. We would then attempt becoming a Zoom choir. There are many questions we need to answer yet before we know if this will work with our group.

Worship Band: This will become the "non-moist" WB for the time being. Guitars, percussion and string instruments will continue to play. Instruments that require blowing into will have to sit out for the time being.



Cherub Choir will be on hold.

There are many protocols that will need to be followed that are not included in this report. We just look forward to a safe return of these modified groups so the music can continue. To God be the glory.

Look at Our New Welcome Sign!



Have a look at our welcome sign recently placed near the Bond Street entrance and near the two entrances from Cambridge Street. You may recognize the multi-coloured image, "Diverse Yet One in Christ" created by Phyllis Baker. It was selected for the United Church of Canada's 2014 calendar and is the banner on the UCC Facebook page. The second image – the rainbow swirling around the fish and cross – tells everyone entering our church building that we are an Affirming congregation and this is a safe space. Our Affirming Ministry Action Group chose the design and words with care.



"Diverse Yet One in Christ" paraphrases a verse from Paul's letter to the Galatians: "In Christ there is no Jew or Greek, slave or citizen, male or female. All are one in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:28). Rev. Craig explained in our June 14, 2020 online worship service that Paul was repudiating the devaluation and inequality of non-Jews, slaves and females under Jewish religious law at that time. Could our new welcome sign help bring Paul's insight into the present at Cambridge Street United in 2020? Who might we (perhaps unintentionally) be devaluing or excluding?

Before becoming an officially Affirming congregation, we were required by our accrediting body, Affirm United, to commit to full inclusion of people of all sexual orientations and gender diversities in the life and work of our church. Affirm United also strongly suggested that we identify other groups of people who may be experiencing barriers to full participation in our community because of age, gender, colour, racialized experience, economic circumstances or any other diversity. Naming in our welcome sign a diversity of people who are often marginalized is an important step toward removing those barriers.



What further steps can we take? Invite people to tell their stories: "Your story enriches and strengthens Cambridge Street United Church, helping us remove barriers to participation and live into God's justice for all." Hearing the stories of people whose life experiences are different from ours is one of the best (and most enjoyable!) ways to learn who they are, how they might enjoy participating and what barriers they may be experiencing.

"Growing together in faith" is the bottom line. An Affirming congregation embarks on an exciting faith journey, learning together to support equity and full participation in our church and society of all God's diverse people. As Jesus did, we give particular love and care to those who have been ignored, excluded, condemned, silenced or erased. And we seek justice for all.

Profile of Andrew Rafton

After the last head of City of Kawartha Lakes' Paramedic services was terminated, Andrew Rafton, who was already in a senior position as Commander of Operations, stepped up to the task.



Andrew earned a diploma in Sports Medicine and a degree in Physical & Health

Education. The job market wasn't very promising in his chosen field. At that time, he was living with a roommate who became a paramedic in Toronto. Back in those early days, it was merely a one-year program, post-diploma or degree, so it was a fast-track way to become a paramedic. He was always interested in first aid and CPR. His roommate allowed Andrew to ride with him in Toronto and it appeared to be an interesting profession. He went back to college for one year and became a paramedic.

Andrew has enjoyed his 35 years of paramedic work across various workplaces, including Ottawa, Oshawa, Minden and Haliburton. "It's not your normal everyday 9-5 type of profession. Every day you go to work, you have to be prepared for the unexpected and every day is different and provides different challenges. And in the end, it's the good wholesome feeling that you have when you're able to help somebody in their moment of distress.

"I oversee approximately 100 paramedic staff and administrative staff here in the city," said Andrew, "and I'm responsible for the oversight of day-to-day operations of our paramedics and our first



responders to all emergency calls within Kawartha Lakes. As the chief, my main responsibility is oversight as far as budget, personnel issues, and in the last [several] months, I happened to deal with overseeing our local response here to the pandemic."

Andrew and his family moved to Lindsay in 2002, and have been active members of Cambridge Street United Church since 1992. Born in Toronto, Andrew spent most of his life in the country, where it was peaceful and left a lasting impression. He and his wife Colleen were living in Toronto and wanted to relocate to a quieter setting to raise their children, and Lindsay "checked off all the boxes on our wish list."

Andrew's advice concerning COVID-19 is, "Don't let your guard down... The real test is obviously going to be this fall with kids returning to school. We are expecting to see a second wave; we just don't know to the

degree." Andrew also has confidence in the citizens of Kawartha Lakes. In the beginning of the pandemic, there was an outpouring of donations of PPE, and because of this generosity and the safety measures which have taken place, "we haven't been hit as hard as other areas in the province."

Andrew plans to retire this November, but his impact on the community shall remain.

Baptism - July 15, 2020


