It has been rewarding to be able to reintroduce many of our special events that haven't been able to take place since pre-COVID. The one event we








The Worship Band played for an appreciative congregation during the Sunday service on April 9, 2023.

Remembering Queen Street

Is you may know, my family and several others in this congregation were originally in the Queen Street congregation. Now that we are amalgamated, it is time to look back on the positive memories from that period.

I recall my wife Lynn, myself and our young family fitting in to a very active Queen Street United Church community in the mid 1970's. Upon leaving our previous church, we had been advised to try Queen Street because we preferred a young and active church family. Rev. Jack Carbert and his wife Diana had built a welcoming environment with a Christian emphasis for rural and working people.



Church school was active with Ernie Eakins as superintendent and Genevieve Payne as chair of Christian Education. There were 75 children on Sunday mornings and some 25 teachers and helpers to provide Christian programming. I recall David C. Cook as the curriculum writer. Lynn Kimmett was the primary superintendent and Joan Smiley served the junior division. There was a developing youth group and later a young couples group. We had fun and felt good about it.

Lynn Cascadden was the dedicated custodian to keep both the church and the Annex (the red brick building to the south) clean and welcoming. At that time, only the first two floors of the Annex were usable but improvements continued to change the old building from a printing shop to an Outreach Centre. There were many stories about the wind blowing through the upper stories or baking with heat in the summer. There was a library there as well which seemed to be a book drop for ministers moving on.

In 1976, the membership role tallied 841 members with good attendance on Sundays. Gordon Everson was the organist and very proud of the pipe organ dedicated at the 50^{th} anniversary in 1928. That organ now sits abandoned in Celebrations.

In 1976, a new ministry model was initiated with Rev. Bessie Lane hired to be the third minister in a team approach between both Queen Street and Cambridge Street. One of her duties was a joint committee to encourage liaison between two congregations. I was on that committee and I remember Fred Copping representing Cambridge Street. One project was to provide a Sunday evening meal to Sir Sandford Fleming College students. Many students were lonely as they did not go home in the winter and we wanted to encourage church activity for them. We often cooked pancakes and sausages on the griddle top stove at Cambridge Street. They were eaten up quickly by

the hungry students. I recall Charlie Glennie enjoyed being the flipper.

These remembrances will need input from those of you who attended Queen Street as those church records have been forwarded to the archives in Toronto. So please dust off your memories; I will be seeking you out.

Gladys joined Cambridge Street United Church at age 23 and is a life member of the United Church Women (U.C.W.).

Gladys grew up in Coboconk, the daughter of Bill and Ella O'Brien. Raised Anglican, she married Charlie Torrance at St. Paul's Anglican Church in Lindsay in 1943 and her first child was christened there. But, she explains, Charlie was an active member of Cambridge Street United. Deciding her family should all attend the same church, Gladys joined Cambridge Street United in 1945. "Eventually", she says, "I became more active in this church than Charlie was."



She enjoyed a close relationship with her sister-in-law Fran (Torrance) Graham, who married Charlie's brother Bruce. (Bruce Torrance died in the 1950s. Fran eventually married Harvey Graham.)

Charlie and Gladys bought a house on Elgin Street in Lindsay. Bruce and Fran bought a home a few doors up the street. Gladys smiles when recalling her children, Linda and Murray, and Fran's children, Janet, Nancy and Peggy, going freely in and out of both houses: "If my children were at Fran's and it was dinner time, she would set plates for them at her table. It was the same if her children were in my home at meal time." All five children attended Cambridge Street United Sunday school.

When asked to identify a highlight of her 78 years as a member of Cambridge Street United, Gladys answers: "The good friends I made in the U.C.W. When you work alongside someone all those years, you get to know her. You know her family and she knows yours." Fondly remembering her contemporaries,



Nama Tummon and others, she laughs: "When you were in a U.C.W. unit headed by Marg Hancock, you served at many church events! We made piles and piles of sandwiches!"


Gladys also knitted dozens of hats and mittens after a dry cleaner in Lindsay began collecting used winter coats to clean and repair for free distribution to anyone in need. She smiles to think of each person who received a coat also receiving a new hat and mitts.

At 101, Gladys has lived through her share of life's sorrows. Charlie died when she was 63. It helped, she says, to think of her grandchild Andrew, born two weeks before Charlie died, as the continuation of Charlie's life. A more recent, abiding sorrow has been the loss of her son Murray to cancer in 2017.

Now living in Lindsay with her daughter Linda, Gladys enjoys overall good health. As her Cambridge Street United Church visitor for 12 years, I wish to thank Gladys for our visits together, graced by the warmth of her kindness, humour and hospitality.
