From the Minister

My dear friends in Christ, what a wonderful experience to be a part of Cambridge Street United Church. Let's share the experience. As we enter into Lent, a time of reflection and connection within, we begin our Easter journey.

On Ash Wednesday, thirty people joined me to walk the canvas labyrinth or used a finger labyrinth. In the centre of the labyrinth was a wee bowl of crystals to choose from for each to carry throughout the Lenten season to remind them of the experience. These wee stones will also help them to remember to pause to be present, to pray and to quietly pass a blessing of peace to those around them.



Rather than giving something up for Lent this season, why not as a community embrace the practice to pause in our day to pass peace and blessings to others. This isn't something you have to do overtly. This pause and prayer can be a conscious choice to smile at another and to silently focus your thoughts on asking God to bless the people around you in that moment. In this season of Lent let's make a commitment to create an intentional pause of love, knowing many people struggle with anxiety and fear every day, some perhaps as deeply as Jesus did at Gethsemane.

You may also choose to join our "Conversations in Faith: A Journey to Easter with Mary Magdalene." This idea arose at our "Liberating Doubt" event, an interest in Mary Magdalene's journey with Jesus to the cross, to become the "apostle to the apostles". We don't have to wait for Easter to hear Mary Magdalene's words, "I have seen the risen Christ", as we can intentionally pause to see this in each other every day. The journey to Easter is truly one of compassion and love for all.

If you were unable to attend the labyrinth event no worries; there will be more opportunities to walk it or use a finger labyrinth to connect within, with God and to enliven your soul. Thank you for the honour to serve you. Peace and blessings.

Father at Carnegie Hall in May. This concert will feature singers from around the world





She was the calm, friendly voice at the end of the telephone if someone needed an ear to listen to them, or needed to hear some words of wisdom to confirm their faith in God during a desperate time in their life. Both were unassuming, outwardly ordinary people who managed to live their faith and in doing so revealed how special their lives were. They are missed.

Whether at Queen Street or now, Cambridge Street, some opportunities to engage in both faith and fellowship are obvious but may not always be appreciated. For example, helping to serve coffee, tea and juice on a Sunday morning or the work of our ushering groups. It's easy to assume that church life simply happens, but there is always a volunteer serving on a committee or putting in long hours for other activities. All these people have distinct voices; sometimes not appreciated until suddenly they are not there.

Sometimes people can only contribute their presence in the pew, recognizing that everyone needs to "retire" from active involvement at some point. Their accumulated wisdom re: life and faith is still very present and should be listened to when advice is needed. Basically, the vitality of a church is a matter of the personal choice of its members and the willingness of others to "hear" what is being said. Thank you for "listening" to me as I have recalled some "voices" from the past.
