

I am often asked how we change the light bulbs in the hanging fixtures in


the sanctuary. I would like to say it is simple, but it is not. The fixtures must be lowered from the attic, which is accessible by one location only — a small hatch in the ceiling at the back (east) wall, which is reached rather precariously with a ladder, as seen in the photo.

In the attic, we unplug the fixture, unhook the chain from which the fixture is suspended and lower it down with a rope until it is accessible just above the floor.



Once the bulb is replaced, the fixture is hauled back up again. The same process is necessary whenever we need to replace or clean the ceiling fans. So, there you have it — I suppose it can be said that the light in our sanctuary descends from realms unseen!

Is Our Church a Cathedral?

I must admit that on rare occasions, I lose focus on the church service and keep looking at the front of our

church. I see a lot of wood. I see a single high pulpit, a wonderful set of organ pipes but the choir loft has difficult access. This makes me wonder — is our chancel design really a cathedral?

Most of what we see was part of the 1886 renovation and Rev. Marmaduke Pearson wanted to make us a prominent methodist church of that time, maybe even with some cathedral features.

In the design of a medieval English cathedral, the sanctuary was aligned from west to east with the high chancel windows allowing in the first light of day.

We sit in the nave. As you move forward, you come to the communion rail which this church once had. This is the start of the chancel, which would include everything forward to the organ pipes. The chancel was considered to be sanctuary from military or political actions. No person could be removed against their will. The altar table would hold the communion elements.

Then toward the congregation, there would be a rood or screen which was a barrier between the chancel and the worshippers. We have to understand that in medieval times, the priest, the organist and quire were educated to their profession. The public worshippers were considered common. In the 16^{th} century, they were cold, often hungry and they smelled.

Within the chancel, there would be a high pulpit to one side and a low pulpit, often on the other side. The organ console, quire pews and pipes were arranged for effect, but the light of the high windows had to shine upon them for morning prayers. Beyond the quire was the apse. Located off the apse, there could be small chapels for private worship or discussion with the priest. The access to these chapels was called the

ambulatory — a narrow walkway with a railing.

Now we return to Cambridge Street. On the upper floor behind our organ pipes, there are the remains of a railing that disappears into the dry wall. If you look from the outside, high up on the west side, is the remains of a doorway from a private room which is now within the cavity of the 1913 organ. This doorway is a mystery. The railing and walkway constitute an ambulatory. So, are we a cathedral?

No. To be a cathedral you need a bishop. Sorry, we do not have a bishop but a reverend at our church. So we continue with an 1886 chancel, a strong quire, an outstanding organ, intergenerational worship and we have heat. We have an ambulatory but we are not a cathedral.






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
